



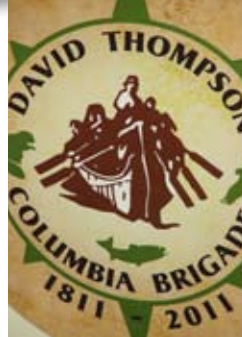

## THE HISTORIC KOOTENAY RIVER

“The Historic Kootenay River” is an historical /interpretive photo essay commemorating the Kootenay River, a major tributary of the Columbia River Basin; the Ktunaxa, First Nation People of the area; the Bicentennial of David Thompson’s Exploration of the Columbia Plateau; the Sternwheel Steamers that plied the Kootenay River and the 2011 David Thompson Columbia Brigade. The project is a “Recognized David Thompson Bicentennial Event.”

The 2011 David Thompson Columbia Brigade was an integral partner in the grand opening for “The Historic Kootenay River” Interpretive sign. On the 3rd day of its six week voyage to the Pacific the brigade arrived at Bummer’s Flats under the deepest blue sky. Local hospitality was generous, starting with breakfast at dawn in Wasa followed by refreshments at noon to greet the paddlers. The festive atmosphere was contagious and drew the crowd into the spell of the past as ten big

canoes rounded the bend. Black Powder signalled their arrival and honoured guest Chief of the St. Mary’s Band as she stepped ashore from the Ktunaxa canoe. Other honoured guests greeting the brigade included the mayor of Kimberley, the Manager of the Conservancy Land Program, Funding Partner representatives and Joseph Cross, contributing artist. An RCMP Constable welcomed guests upon their arrival.

A tribute to the enduring roots of community, a “Single Vision” came to fruition during the Grand Opening for “The Historic Kootenay River” Interpretive Sign nine months to the day from its conception. It was nurtured by the exemplary interest and support of its Partners until its completion. Proudly, it stands at Middle Bummer’s Flats adjacent to the Kootenay River commemorating local history!

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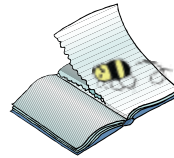

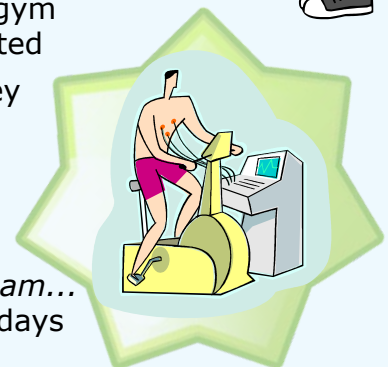

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**WASA LIONS COMMUNITY INITIATIVES PROGRAMME RECEIVES  
2011-2012 C. B. T. FUNDING**

We are pleased to announce that for the 12<sup>th</sup> consecutive year The Wasa Lions Community Initiative Committee has received funding to support eligible R.D.E.K. Area E residents and groups in a variety of activities.

Funding for the current year is \$12, 219.88

Grants from June 1<sup>st</sup> 2011 to May 31<sup>st</sup> 2012 are available in three broad areas:

- A. Community activities and facilities
- B. Youth and adult educational assistance
- C. Youth and adult health and recreation. Last year the programme assisted 31 Area E groups or individuals for a variety of activities within the above broad areas.

Question from Natasha Wilson

*"I have a question for Vi's Gardening Column. I have tried twice to transplant Lilac bushes and everytime the Lilac bush died. I am told they are a weed and they should grow anywhere, anytime. I have wonderful memories associated with Lilac bushes and I really want some growing on my property."*

Vi's Response:

With regards to planting lilacs, the best time to transplant is early spring and make sure you get lots of the roots. Dig a large hole, use good soil then add a pail of water. Place bush and fill with soil. Hope this works! Good luck and have a great summer!

### DOUG FORD ZONING AMENDMENT APPLICATION

This application did not proceed. I received several emails and phone calls regarding this application and the majority of residents asked for an Official Community Plan to be completed for the WASA – TATA CREEK – SKOOKUMCHUCK – SHEEP CREEK area. There was also great concern regarding the groundwater. During the Board Meeting, several Directors spoke about their water concerns and the potential impact on the community. Concerns regarding the aquifer rating were also heard. I was apprehensive to give my support to the application because if the application were approved and we were to find out later that the groundwater could be compromised we could not change the zoning or reverse the application. The only way in which the development could not go forward was if the Ministry of Transportation would not allow Mr. Ford to subdivide.

I am aware that many residents were not in favor of this potential development, but I am hoping to work with the residents, business owners, developers and the Wasa Lake Land Improvement District (WLLID) to generate funding to support the completion of an Aquifer Study.

### OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN

I will continue to pursue the RDEK's approval to create an Official Community Plan in 2012. This

process will allow area residents the opportunity to be heard, to ask questions and to ultimately participate in deciding how our communities will proceed. Once the Official Community Plan and the Aquifer Study have been completed, the RDEK Board will have a much clearer understanding of what the community wants and what will be safe for both the community and the lake.

### COSMETIC PESTICIDE BAN

The RDEK Board voted to support Provincial Bill 203, The Cosmetic Pesticide Ban.

### WASA COLUMBARIA

The RDEK Board has applied for a "Request for a Certificate of Public Interest" to establish a Columbaria at the Wasa Memorial Garden.

### SPECIAL THANK YOU

# HISTORY BYTES

## FIRST PLANE OVER THE ROCKIES

The British Columbia Branch of the Aerial League (a fancy name for a Flying Club) soon after WW I, set their sights on conquering the space between Vancouver and southern Alberta. There were no groomed and designated airfields in those days. A route was formulated with suitable landing sites where refuelling could be done. This was a cooperative effort of newspaper editors in Vancouver, Lethbridge and Calgary and the town of Golden, BC. A group of recently discharged Royal Flying Corps pilots vied for the opportunity to make that challenging flight in a 90 HP Curtiss JN4, "flying Jennie". These were the planes used to train Canadian and US pilots for service in the first World War. The only change to the plane was the addition of a 12 gallon fuel tank to extend flight time to four hours at 75 mph. Names were put into a hat and the winner was Captain Ernest Hoy DFC.

Captain Hoy attempted to make the flight on Monday, August 4, 1919 but turned around at Chilliwack due to heavy cloud formation.

He set off again from Minoru Park race track in Richmond at 4:30 am on August 7, 1919, was seen over Chilliwack at 5 am, and reached Vernon safely to refuel at 7:18 am. The citizens of Grand Forks welcomed him at 10:34 am. Cranbrook "received him with great acclaim" at 2:05 pm. And he left again at 3:25 pm. (The landing strip was likely where Theatre Road runs today.)

Hoy set his course for Lethbridge, experiencing great difficulty because his plane had a ceiling of only 7000

feet. The pilot had to sneak through passes praying that there were no sudden up or down drafts. The whole population of Lethbridge cheered him on as he set off for Calgary. Dusk was setting in. There were flares in Bowness Park and headlights turned on by the car owners waiting to greet the plane. The entire flight took 16 hours 42 minutes of which four hours were used for socializing and refuelling and 12 hours and 34 minutes were airborne.

Captain Hoy stayed in Calgary until August 11<sup>th</sup>. He planned to fly home by a more northerly route over Banff, Field, Golden, Revelstoke and westward. He left Calgary at 9:50 am and set down in a field in Golden at 12:30 pm. As he attempted to launch, bouncing through the stubble of Tom King's freshly cut oat patch, the crowd gasped as the Jenny lurched and a wing broke off. The distressed pilot admitted he could not make repairs so the plane was shipped back to Vancouver via railway car. Captain Hoy claimed the honour of being the first to cross the Rocky Mountains, both ways, by plane. He flew solo on a wing and a prayer. We are grateful to him and his cohorts for those cautious initial flights which preceded our current ease of transportation.

Cranbrook had a designated airstrip by 1932. The Wasa-Kimberley airstrip became official in 1939. Commercial flights commenced in 1947. Air travel over the mountain ranges of British Columbia has gradually become safer with larger planes, organized ground support, weather reports, radio communication and familiarity with the terrain.

Fanny's Favorites

BOSTON BAKED BEANS

Soak overnight in water, 3 cups small white beans.

Rinse, drain and add fresh water and boil for 45 minutes (reserve water).

In crockpot or bean pot place 4 pieces salt pork (approx 1 " cubes) in bottom of pot, add 1/2 of beans, layer remaining salt pork and beans.

Dissolve: 3 Tbsp Brown Sugar and 3/4 tsp dried mustard in 1 Tbsp water. Pour on top of beans. Pour approx. 1/2 cup molasses over bean mixutre. (Fanny sometimes also adds maple syrup!)

Add enough of the reserved (bean) water to cover beans. Cover and bake at 275° for approx 6 hours. Add water throughout and do not allow beans to dry out. Beans are ready when soft.
